Pupil Premium Budget Audit 2016-2017

Pupil Premium Grant Funding is provided for any child who is from a family meeting a range of low income criteria. In the past this would have meant the child was eligible for free school meals. Once eligible the child is entitled to the funding for 6 years. They are therefore also known as Ever 6 or FSM6.

Aims:

- To ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all our children.
- To meet social, pastoral and academic needs of children who are socially disadvantaged.
- To facilitate access to the curriculum.
- To facilitate appropriate support and intervention.
- To support children who do not have additional / complex SEND needs to meet 'expected level' at the end of each Key Stage.
- To ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.

Provision:

- Providing small group and 1:1 work with an experienced teacher focussed on overcoming gaps in learning
- 1:1 support additional teaching and learning opportunities provided through trained TAs or external agencies.
- All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving children to at least age related expectations. Initially this will be in Literacy and Numeracy.
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged.
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. Pupil premium funding is allocated following a needs analysis which identifies priority classes, groups or individuals.

How we used the funding:

- Small intervention groups or 1:1 sessions to support children where they have gaps in their learning or are not at age related expectations.
- Supporting children to access extra-curricular activities such as visitors into school etc.

- Counselling service for children who are experiencing difficulties in their lives.
- Subscription to Creative Learning Services to provide resources for each class and update our library stock.
- To fund out of school learning opportunities.
- To provide peripatetic music lessons.
- To provide after school care and clubs.
- To provide uniform for children when required.

Impact:

Of the 23 children eligible for Pupil Premium last year, 9 were also SEND pupils, 4 had arrived new to the school in KS2 (two were emergency placements) and 12 were EAL pupils. Out of the 23 children, 6 achieved age related expectations in Reading, Writing and Maths. In our Year 6 class, there were 7 children who received Pupil Premium out of a class of 22 pupils. 4 of these were EAL children and 1 was SEND.

Of our total cohort of 22 pupils, 17 children made good progress in Reading, 16 made good progress in Writing and 17 made good progress in Maths (at least 6 steps progress). This was accelerated progress for some pupils who received quality first teaching intervention, either in small groups or on a 1:1 basis.

All children receiving the grant benefitted from being able to access extra curricular activities which were covered in part by the Pupil Premium budget.
