### **School Uniform: Advent 2 Term**

The children should now be wearing their winter uniform until the start of the Summer term (After the Easter holidays.) The Winter uniform is the blue shirt and tie, with black or navy- blue trousers, skirt or pinafore. On PE days, pupils come to school wearing their PE kits. We would advise wearing black or navy-blue tracksuits for PE in these colder months, white or blue t-shirts only. On PE days <u>all jewellery should be removed</u>. If earrings cannot be removed, please put earring tape <u>over it at home</u>. The only jewellery allowed are ear studs (not hoops) and analogue watches. Smart (digital) watches or fit bits cannot be worn in school.

A reminder to label each item of clothing please. There are increasing amounts of jumpers in lost property, which we cannot return to children as they are not named. Thank you for your support on this.

# **Attendance Matters**

Thank you to all parents who attended parent teacher meetings last term. Hopefully your class teacher has told you what your child's attendance is. If your child's attendance is above 95%, then they have made a great start to the year. We do recognise that on occasion, absence is unavoidable, or there has been genuine illness. Evidence shows that pupils with consistently high attendance and punctuality throughout their time in school, gain better end of year results.

St Mary's aims to maintain all pupil's attendance at the highest levels possible, considering individual pupil circumstances and needs. As part of our pastoral care, when a pupil's attendance has fallen below 95% and there is significant absence, we explore if there are any additional support systems we can put in place, working with parents. As always, we appreciate your continued support, please do not hesitate to get in touch if there is anything further you wish to discuss. Please ring the school office every day your child is ill, stating what the symptoms are and not just my child is not well. This helps the school have the correct code on the registers.

### **Religious Education**

The pupils learn from the Catholic Come and See programme, doing 3 units, but have also learnt a week each on other faiths Judaism and Islam. They spend two hours a week on RE.

### RSHE- relationships, sex and health education and Personal Development Curriculum

The new RSHE Ten Ten lessons programme of study is being used at St Mary's this term, in line with the blocked curriculum for the other foundation subjects. Teachers do inform parents and share resources as appropriate before the lessons with parents. Parents were also invited to the consultations of using these materials before the school adopted this programme. Teachers are happy to share what the children are learning in these lessons. The lessons follow the Catholic ethos, but also address wider lessons from PHSE, such citizenship, money responsibility, friendships and staying safe. The RSE is currently on the school website, the new RSHE materials will be placed on the website this term. The school has a sequenced and progressive personal development curriculum for each year group, which addresses areas such as road safety, water safety, online safety and British Values such as democracy to name a few.

### **English and Mathematics**

English and Mathematics are taught in the mornings. Year Two to Year Six have a daily lesson of each of these subjects. Reading is at the centre of the English lessons and Junior pupils also have an additional reading session with their teachers in the afternoon, twice a week- called shared modelled reading. EYFS and Year one focus on early reading and phonics through the Little Wandle programme. Each class also has a story time at 3p.m. The White Rose maths scheme is used to teach Mathematics, but pupils also practise times tables on rock stars.

### **PE: Physical Education**

Mr Headley and Mr Mitchell are the school's new sport's coaches. Each class has about 2 hours of PE, as they do the daily mile in addition to their PE lessons. The junior classes also have a half term of swimming lessons. This important life skill is an essential part of the PE curriculum, as Year 6 pupils should be able to swim 25m on their front and back. The pupils learn a range of skills. This term they will be doing gymnastics and dance.

<u>Foundation subjects: History, Geography, Science, Art and Design and Technology, Music and Computing</u> This Academic year some subjects such as Geography, History, Art, design and Science are taught in blocks-

hence called the blocked curriculum. The subject is taught each afternoon for two weeks, rather than having 1 lesson each week spread over the half term. The school has adopted this approach, as it enables pupils to remember more and apply more complex ideas in their work as they are focusing on 1 subject for the week. This also helps pupils with SEND needs. Music is taught weekly by Mrs Leaney on Wednesdays. All classes have the opportunity to learn musical instruments, but the Junior classes will have their own recorder to learn this year. All the teachers are learning this too. The classes all have computing lessons, using the school's laptops and tablets which have a secure filtering system. In each lesson they learn about online safety.

### Parent teacher meetings October 23 and Survey Comments

"Ensure doors open promptly in the mornings." Staff reminded of doors open at 8.35a.m.

"Helping children to understand the importance of study for their future life more." (We will have a vocations/ jobs week inviting visitors to talk about their jobs and what qualifications they had to get.)

"More notification of bad behaviour." We will be using the school registration system of Arbor to send you more timely reports on good and negative behaviour. "Notify earlier about certificates."

"Nothing- we are really pleased with everything."

"Improvement of the toilet facilities and playgrounds." The head teacher will continue looking for grants to improve the playground facilities and toilets. Your fundraising with the FOSM helps immensely with this. This Academic year the fencing in the Junior and infant playground will be improved this term. The trim trail in the junior playground will be removed this term and this Academic year a new trim trail will be installed.

"More activities and art" There is an increased range of extra-curricular clubs including art and singing clubs this term. The pupils have all been engaging in more art lessons this term. We will be doing some whole school art activities this Academic year.

"Talent exploration activities." Fosm talent show- but will also have more enrichment afternoonswhere children can develop talents and inviting visitors in for this. The St Thomas Aquinas Academy will be sending out parent surveys from Arbor to all parents to be filled in between the 6<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> of November. Your feedback really helps the school to improve, so we are very grateful for the time you take to fill in Surveys.
