SCHOOL REVIEW DAY

Each year all the schools in the St Thomas Aquinas Academy have a review day to look at strengths in the school and areas for development. It was lovely to read about so many strengths and areas to develop, which the school was already working on. Below are just a few of each.

Strengths:

There are strong levels of care for the most vulnerable with a particular focus on SEND learners and pupil premium. This extends beyond the school day and leaders have access to a wide range of external agencies in order to support families.

Early years provision is a strength of the school. Staff maintain high expectations and the creative provision is fully inclusive.

Personal development is a strength of the school and the extra- curricular offer is rich and varied.

Areas to develop

Look at the impact of the french teaching- are children remembering key concepts and are prepared for KS3. Pupils to revisit information between the blocked subjects.

Have the same provision for morning playtime as lunchtime on the year 1 and 2 playground.
